The Mentor-Mentee system is implemented for all UG, PG courses. For each mentor is allotted about 15 Mentees. Mentors are allotted from the team of faculty those who handling the subjects for Mentees in the particular semester/academic year. The activities or problems are reported by the students are recorded in the Mentor-Mentee book/sheet. Mentoring committee is constituted to follow up the mentor activities of the institution. Mentors counsel the students every week. A mentor book for each student is maintained by the mentor. 2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The institution ensures that the stakeholders of the institution particularly students and faculty are aware of the examination and evaluation processes. Before the commencement of the classes of the new entrants, the college organizes an induction programme to the students and their parents. The principal along with the senior faculty members and class advisors impart the students and their parents about the rules and regulations of the institute and norms of the evaluation process as prescribed by the University. They are also provided with the details of the examination pattern both for theory and practical. As the college is affiliated to ANU it is bound to follow the examination process as prescribed by the University. The Institute has initiated various reforms as listed below: The institution has an integrated examination platform for continuous internal evaluation in accordance with the university examination regulations. In college, an Examination Cell is formed to co-ordinate and conduct internal Examinations. The examination committee prepares the schedule for the submission of question papers and evaluation of

answer sheets with regard to sessional examinations which is circulated to all the concerned. Two sessional exams are conducted for all the subjects of B. Pharmacy and M. Pharmacy Courses in each semester. Whereas three sessional exams are conducted for all the subjects of Pharm D Course in a year. The sessional examination time table is displayed on the notice board of Exam Cell, Library and others at least one week before the commencement. The examinations are held under strict vigilance. The principal and examination committee keep a close eye so as to prevent the use of unfair by the students. Evaluated sessional theory answer sheets are shown to the students. At the end of the year, the average internal marks (average of the best two internals) are also shown to the students. The Examination Cell supervises the entry of internal marks. Further the grievance of the students if any is addressed by the Examination Cell and Principal. For practical examination, the internal assessment is done on the basis of day to day performance like record maintenance, day to day activities and viva-voce. Formative evaluation approaches are carried out based on the subject knowledge, Attendance, participation to the Seminars, Assignments and Practical marks.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Preparation of the Academic Calendar begins well before the commencement of the academic year. The Academic calendar is designed in line with the affiliating University's Academic calendar and takes into consideration the examinations, holidays and vacation. The academic calendar is prepared by Principal in consultation with HOD(s). It includes all the professional events, sports, annual day celebrations, Conferences, Expo, National days, National health awareness days, Departmental events and festival celebrations, etc.,
